	<b>W/H Qs</b> <b>direct</b> Cathy asked, "What time is it?" <b>reported</b> Cathy asked what time it <b>was</b> .

## ANSWER KEY

7. Maggie asked (me) where Tom was.
8. Maggie asked (me) where Mary worked.

## GRAMMAR NOTE

It's not always necessary to change the verb in reported speech. If the situation **is still the same**, you do not need to change the verb to past.

*For example:*

Maggie asked where Mary works.

(The situation is still the same and Mary still works at the same place.)
